

Dean Peachey CLASS OF 1972

How did BMS help your heart and mind to grow and flourish?

It was clear that the BMS teachers cared about us as individuals. That was a positive thing for this kid who often felt constricted by the layers of tradition and conservative expectations I encountered while growing up. Several BMS teachers showed that it was possible to be committed to the church and at the same time to question or rethink the traditions.

Was there a teacher, team, or experience here at BMS that influenced you in specific ways?

Del Glick, as Phys ed teacher and coach had a huge impact on me. He taught us that through hard work, team spirit and determination, a little school like ours could compete with teams from much bigger and better funded schools. Through him I gained self-confidence and pride in being a BMS student.

Linda Nolt's English class helped me become a better writer, a skill that served me well throughout my life. Her notes on the margins of my essays not only pointed the way to better prose, they also sometimes poked and prodded me to think more deeply about what I had written—which meant thinking more deeply about myself and my motivations in the writing.

How did your BMS experience help to prepare you for life?

We were a small student body, so there were lots of opportunities to be involved in extra-curricular activities. Looking back, I was probably involved in too many activities, but editing the yearbook and other projects gave me experience in organizing and leadership that shaped my life as much or more than what I learned in the classroom.

As you reflect on how others invested in you at BMS, are there any other thoughts or ideas that come to mind?

As a student, I was aware of how my parents scrimped and saved so that they could pay tuition to send us to BMS. I saw other parents similarly invested in Christian education, and that made an impact on me.


What was your educational and career path following graduation?

I went to EMU and majored in psychology, then to the

University of Waterloo in Ontario for an MA and PhD in psychology with a particular interest in social conflict. That lead to a variety of activities. I worked for a couple decades in mediation and conflict resolution while teaching university courses part time, then was full-time in university life for another twenty years in various administrative roles as well as teaching. I am now blissfully retired!

How did the Lord lead you to your vocation(s)?

Del Glick liked to quote Elizabeth O'Conner that God's will for our lives is written into our gifts. That seemed to make sense to me, and I explored those various gifts one step at a time. I never had an overall career goal of plan.

Reflecting on my work life, some of my favorite memories are of encounters with students, especially in human rights and conflict resolution "field courses" in a variety of settings in Canada and overseas.
